



## I'M SPEAKING EMBROIDERY PATTERN

I am so excited for you to be stitching this hoop! The five stitches you'll be using for this hoop are: back stitch, fishbone, lazy daisy, woven rose, and french knot.

As you can see from the image above, we will be using back stitch for the lettering and stars and foliage stems, fishbone and lazy daisy for the leaves, woven rose for the circular florals, lazy daisy for the daisy petals and the french knot for the centers of the flowers.

This pattern is for personal use only, do not resell this pattern or your finished hoop.

# MATERIALS

## TO GET STARTED, HERE ARE THE MATERIALS YOU'LL NEED:

- **FLOSS** - You will want 8 different colors of thread. 2 for the foliage, 2 for the floral petals, 2 for the flower centers, 1 for the lettering and 1 (preferably light effects thread) for the stars.
- **FABRIC** - Any kind of fabric will work! I typically use a linen blend or Kona cotton. Both of those are readily available at any fabric store.
- **NEEDLES** - to easily use all six strands, I recommend using a size 5 needle.
- **SCISSORS** - Larger ones to cut fabric, and any kind of snips you would like for the thread!
- **EMBROIDERY HOOP** - This hoop was originally designed to be in a 6 inch hoop, but you can go smaller or larger if you wish.
- **WATER SOLUBLE/HEAT ERASABLE PEN** - Pilot FriXion Clicker Retractable Erasable Gel Pens or LEONIS 10 Water Erasable Marking Pens Blue are what I have used. Both work well on light fabric. If you want to use dark fabric, I suggest using fabri solvy.

## TIPS

- I have stitched this hoop using 3 strands of thread for the lettering, 6 strands for the flowers (both petals and the centers). All the greenery is stitched using 3 strands of thread, and the stars use 1 strand. Metallic thread can be tricky, so the thinner it is, the easier it will be to use it.
- When placing your fabric in the hoop to stitch, make sure your fabric is taught like a drum. If your fabric is too loose in your hoop, your stitches might end up puckering the fabric and it won't look as clean.
- To trace your pattern, I prefer to use a Pilot Frixion heat erasable pen. You can also use a water soluble pen, or transfer paper. When tracing, you can print out the pattern and trace using a window or a light table. Another option would be using a tablet or computer monitor as a light table and tracing directly from the device. That's what I do, and it works like a charm!
- While stitching, there are lots of great video tutorials on youtube for stitches if you need any guidance!
